
NEW MUSIC CONCERTS 1980-81



Dedicated to the sounds of our time, New Music Concerts presents the world's most distinguished contemporary composers and their music. Founded by Toronto composer and broadcaster Norma Beecroft and flutist-composer Robert Aitken, the subscription concerts feature a crosssection of international musical styles as well as the latest creations of Canadian composers.

Since its inaugural event in January

1972, New Music Concerts has presented performances of over 400 works, the majority of them first hearings in Canada, and many of them world premieres. The list of distinguished artists invited to participate in the concerts have included such international figures as Berio, Cage, Ligeti, Globokar, Holliger, Takemitsu, Foss, Reich, Carter, Glass, Feldman, Babbitt, Birtwistle, Xenakis, Kagel, Crumb, Lutoslawski, Maxwell Davies, Nordheim, Bussotti, and many others. Ensembles with unique repertoire have presented concerts, and music by leading Canadian composers constitutes a major portion of each season's programming. In celebration of its tenth anniversary, audience favourites from the past nine seasons of New Music Concerts will return to join in the festivities. Luciano Berio, the noted Italian composer who was the first guest of New Music Concerts, opens the 1980-81 series in a program of his own music. Other guests making second New Music Concerts' appearances include-Heinz Holliger, virtuoso Swiss oboist and composer; Vinko Globokar, unique trombonist and composer (Yugoslavia-France); Leo Brouwer, extraordinary Cuban guitarist and composer; György Ligeti (Hungary-Austria), the composer publicly acclaimed for his contributions to the film 2001; and the inimitable and innovative friend of new music, composer John Cage (USA). New Music Concerts introduces for the first time-award-winning Japanese composer Joji Yuasa; worldrenowned organist and composer William Albright (USA); Japanese soprano of extraordinary range and vocal expression Michiko Hirayama; and two Belgian groups, l'Ensemble Musique Nouvelle with Henri Pousseur, and the SEM Ensemble. The 1980-81 season offers exciting Canadian premieres, specially commissioned by New Music Concerts, from Robert Aitken, Walter Buczynski,

Otto Joachim, Marjan Mozetich, Claude Vivier and Joji Yuasa.
