Born in Canada, Robert Aitken studied with Nicholas Fiore and Marcel Moyse and for shorter periods with Jean-Pierre Rampal, Severino Gazzelloni, André Jauvet and Hubert Barwahser. At the age of 19 he became principal flute of the Vancouver Symphony and at age 24, the Toronto Symphony. He has been the recipient of many awards including the Order of Canada and the Chevalier de l'ordre des Arts et des Lettres (France) and prizes at the international flute contests in Paris 1971 and Royan 1972. Some 50 works have been written for him by noted composers including George Crumb, Elliott Carter, Toru Takemitsu, Roger Reynolds, Arne Nordheim, Manuel Enriquez, R. Murray Schafer, Gilles Tremblay, Bruce Mather, John Beckwith and John Weinzweig. He has more than 40 recordings to his credit.

In 1970 Robert Aitken founded and directed until 1972 the "Music Today" series at the Shaw Festival (Ontario) and in 1971 co-founded with Norma Beecroft New Music Concerts of which he is still artistic director. He taught 1960-75 at the University of Toronto, 1972-82 at the Shawnigan Summer School of the Arts (British Columbia) and in 1981 founded "Music at Shawnigan", a 3-week festival devoted to advanced chamber music study. From 1985-89 he was director of the Advanced Studies in Music program at the Banff School of Fine Arts (Alberta). Aitken has given master classes in many countries including Cuba, France, Germany, Hungary, Iceland, Mexico, Norway, Poland, Sweden and the U.S.A. Since 1988 he has been professor at the Staatliche Hochschule für Musik in Freiburg, Germany.

In spite of his relatively small output, Robert Aitken is one of Canada's outstanding composers. Like several other Canadian who travelled in East Asia (Gilles Tremblay, Claude Vivier and José Evangelista), he has been profoundly influenced by contact with non-Western musical cultures as can be heard in the program he will present Live at the MacLaren on March 9. Mr. Aitken will discuss and perform selections from the following works:

He has appeared with major orchestras and such ensembles as the percussion group Nexus and the Orford and Purcell string quartets. In 1998 he joined the renowned **Quartetto Gelato** with whom he has performed in hundreds of concert engagements around the world.
