

You and I will have to do it now." Lest anyone make a hero of Jim, *Listen...!* will be performed by Marion Newman coaching two young singers.

This concert features rarely-performed works of John Cage – *BirdCage* for 12 tapes and *HPSCHD* for 7 amplified harpsichords and tapes. The performances will feature original Cage collaborators Joel Chadabe (sound), David Eisenman (visuals) and Donald J. Gillies. Performers will include Eve Egoyan, Marc Couroux, Bob Doidge, Tania Gill, Gayle Young, George Boski, William Blakeney, Robert Wheeler and others.

John Cage composed *BirdCage* in 1971, working with Joel Chadabe, the founder and president of the *Electronic Music Foundation*. Cage's composition consisted of 12 half-hour tapes with three tracks of recorded sounds: the chirping of birds in aviaries, the electronically treated sounds of Cage reading words from Thoreau's *Walden*, and fragments of found sounds and ambient street noise. In "performing" the piece, Cage operated a matrix mixer to select from the various

tapes at random. Joel Chadabe has prepared a spatialized, new realization of the work for a digital age in which a software program continually, and randomly, selects from the recorded materials.


HPSCHD, by John Cage and Lejaren Hiller (1969), is arguably the wildest composition of the 20th century. Big, brash, exuberant, raucous, a performance involves hours of ongoing high-level intensity. The sound is a mixture of seven amplified harpsichords playing computer-generated variations of Mozart and other composers along with 51 computer-generated tapes playing what could be off-tuned trumpets sounding some musical charge. The thousands of swirling images, overlaid and mixed, of abstract shapes and colours and of space imagery from slides and films borrowed from NASA, create a chaotic riot of shifting form and colour.

Visitors can peruse a small gallery of John Cage's historic original *Fluxus* posters and artwork associated with the debut performance.

The complete presentation will last for 4 hours, but visitors are invited to come and go at will; something of which Cage, no doubt, would have approved.

THE CREATIVE LEGACY OF GIACINTO SCELSI

Scelsi's music explores the qualities of 'sound inside the sound'. In the 1960s many avant-garde composers were exploring the inner life of sounds, writing music which focussed on small fluctuations within sustained sonic bands. Scelsi's work from this period is characterized by the profound subjectivity of his engagement with his material, an engagement in which abstraction seemed to play no part. Pitch, timbre, register and dynamics are heard as the inherent expressive potentialities of each sound, rather than as separate parameters to be controlled independently. Later compositions explore this 'materiality' of sound further, drawing a handful of musical strands out of an initial tone. His work can be heard to anticipate later developments of 'spectral' music and the exploration of the pitch-timbre continuum in computer music.

SCELSI IN WORDS AND MUSIC

Scelsi's world of sound and poetry is explored by Frances-Marie Uitti and Sharon Kanach, In Scelsi's music, tone is all-powerful - music returns to its primitive origins, when melody formed from noise. Frances-Marie Uitti worked with the composer in transcribing and realizing several of his cello works. Featured in this concert will be Ygghur (Sanskrit for catharsis) which is considered as the composer's autobiography, and was dedicated to Uitti, and readings from his writings on music, art, philosophy as well as excerpts from his autobiography and his little-known poetry. An 'avant-première' before their pending publication in English by Pendragon Press. Readings by Sharon Kanach, Scelsi's last musical assistant (1979-1988) who has compiled the three-volume set of his complete writings (in French) for Actes-Sud.

soundaXis '08 takes place in Toronto May 21 to June 15, 2008. This is the second of a biennial series of soundaXis festivals to be presented by New Music Arts Projects (NMAP). NMAP is a not-for-profit arts organization formed by key members of the Toronto Coalition of New Music Presenters. Working in cooperation with the coalition, NMAP exists to conceive and organize innovative events that capture the imagination of the general public and attract an international audience. NMAP operates as both an umbrella organization for concerts and events presented by members of the coalition, and a presenter of its own curated events.

The **soundaXis** festivals explore the interaction, mutual definition and shared fundamentals between music and other forms of expression and artistic practice. **soundaXis** is the forum in which new music opens the discussion between modes of creative cultural composition and expression in the contemporary city. Non-music arts organizations and institutions collaborate with *NMAP* by participating in **soundaXis**. This community of contributors fosters discussion, exploration and collaborations, and continually presents

fresh and innovative ways to consider and experience New Music. The first **soundaXis** festival took place in June 2006 and explored connections between music and architecture.

soundaXis '08 focuses on materials and textures in music, in both composition and performance. extending the boundaries of instrumentation. acoustics, percussion, electronics and improvisation. The theme serves as a platform for programming works of composers whose work is about or concerned with materials: composers who explore the acoustic properties of sound itself as the basis of compositional material, the 'sound inside the sound.' the physics of music, extended sound possibilities of musical instruments, percussive sounds of drums and found objects, electronic music, microtonal and improvisational music. soundaXis '08 will encompass concerts, conferences, symposia and screenings. Featured composers include Giacinto Scelsi, Georges Aperghis, John Cage, James Tenney and Claude Vivier. soundaXis '08 also features several world premieres of New Music

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
