
Poster artwork from the Wavelength music series, 2000-2010

The Wavelength music series has been a key incubator in Toronto's independent and underground music scenes since its inception in early 2000. Now internationally renowned artists from the region – from Broken Social Scene and the Constantines to Born Ruffians and Crystal Castles – performed important early gigs there, and the series continues to champion emerging talent and connect like-minded artists from different circles. Wavelength has been an important point of interface between the indie and experimental/new music scenes since its early days, when Michael Snow first screened his 1968 film of the same name alongside a programme of local improvisers – music then rarely heard in a club environment. Since 2003, Wavelength has presented one night of its annual, multi-night February Anniversary Festivals here at the Music Gallery.

Poster artwork has been a key element in the Wavelength identity, especially around the Anniversaries. This exhibition displays some of the most memorable promotional posters of the series' first decade. Contributing artists include: Seripop, The Complaint Department, Trip Print Press, Deadweight and Derek Ma.

Trouble in the Camera Club


Photographed by musician and producer Don Pyle (Shadowy Men on a Shadowy Planet, Black Heel Marks) from 1976 to 1980, these images explode with youthful beauty and tragic self-absorption, shining a harsh light on the chaotic creation, destruction and camaraderie surrounding the birth of the ugly child that became known as punk.

Pyle's pictures present a unique and rare perspective on the sorely underdocumented Toronto scene, illustrating a significant leap in the creation of independent music culture. Canada's premiere bands of the new breed — The Ugly, The Curse, Teenage Head, The Viletones, The Diodes and DO.A. — are shown at their earliest gigs, alongside candid moments of street scenes, friends and foreign dignitaries — including the first local performances of the Ramones, The Dead Boys, Iggy Pop, The Clash and more.

Many of the images on display act as a preview to Pyle's forthcoming book, Trouble In The Camera Club, published by ECW Press on May 1,2011.

Toronto has never been the same since, these historic and unparalleled photographs illustrate why.

Pemi Paull's activities have brought him to the forefront of Montréal's contemporary music world. In the sphere of historical performance, Pemi is a member of Ensemble Caprice, with whom he has recorded four discs for Analekta, winning a Juno in the process. He also appears regularly with Les Idees Heureuses, Ensemble Arion, and Daniel Taylor's Theatre of Early Music.

In 2008, Daniela Gesundheit of Snowblink moved from California to Toronto, irreversibly altering Snowblink from a whimsical warm-weather band touting four male back-up singers to the current acclaimed duo with Dan Goldman (Luxury Pond). Snowblink quickly became "one of the most compelling new voices on the Canadian scene" (CBC) as 2010 saw them opening for Owen Pallett, Timber Timbre, The Acorn, Apostle of Hustle, and The Hidden Cameras on extended tours throughout the US, Canada, and Europe. Gesundheit also toured extensively through Canada as part of the Toronto

band Bruce Peninsula, and recently participated in the National Parks Project trip to Cape Breton alongside Tony Dekker (Great Lake Swimmers) and Chris Luedecke (Old Man Luedecke).

To celebrate Out Of This Spark's release of their debut album, *Long Live*, Snowblink will team up with installation artist/puppeteer Sean Frey for a multi-media presentation of their songs.

Toronto's Chris Cummings is a record collector and musician who performs under the name Mantler. His fourth album, *Monody*, was released in 2010. Over the past decade, Cummings has gained a devoted international following for his unique, soulful pop music. That Cummings is an ardent cinephile is known to many of his fans, with his film-inflected lyrics and Sirkian swirls of melodrama. Mantler's music finds fascinating parallels with both Golden Hollywood moodiness and a rich tradition of avant-garde filmmaking that emerged in the 1920s and radicalized film's relationship to music thereafter.

Gathered together from memories of years of film-watching, this lovingly assembled collection offers a bouquet of visions — from the expanding god's-eyes of Oskar Fischinger's *Motion Painting No.1* to the pastel-blue cutouts of Larry Jordan's *Gymnopedies*—each of which could serve as a visual analogue to architecture critic Summerson's consideration of music.

The Earwax Ensemble: Indigenous Music from Skyscraper National Park

Toronto's Earwax Ensemble, a quintet led by artistic director Charlotte Mundy, presents a live mixtage of music from New York City. A series of short works by NYC composers – four members of the experimental "downtown" New York scene (Reich, Brown, Wolff and Feldman), one jazz musician (Monk), one composer of musicals (Sondheim) and two students at the Manhattan School of Music (Dillon and Perdue) – represent a tiny fraction of the experimentation and creative energy that have found a home in the city since the early 20th century.

VOWLS is a four-piece band from Toronto that combines the energetic inventiveness of mutant-disco and post-punk with the pan-global influences and technological embrace of krautrock. Taking up the call for what Brian Eno claims is the greatest challenge in music today, VOWLS aren't afraid to play "pop" music



either. In a way, they use it as a Trojan horse, playing with its conventions and boundaries in order to create something wholly new, simultaneously visionary and provocative. In 2009, the band toured with Stones Throw artist Koushik, pulling off the double duty of opening and playing as his backing band.

Gates

Emerging from the depths of winter, a stark journey through the unconscious passageways of the mind... Gates draws on the latent abstraction within doom, the hallucinatory drift of ambient, but also the unremitting sonic bleakness of black metal to create engulfing and imposing experimentalism. Seeking transcendence through these droning, dense textural layers, Gates will be performing their album Moths Have Eaten the Core.

Dancing back to Toronto following its festival performance in Montreal, Continuum repeats the four new works premiered there, or rather one new work by four composers. Ensuite echoes the French dance suite, but its four movements are by different composers: Ouverture by Cassandra Miller (Montreal), Allemande by Nicolas Gilbert (Montreal), Sarabande by Linda Smith (Toronto) and Gigue by Lori Freedman (Montreal). Other works are Doves Figary for solo cello by Michael Finnissy (UK), based on the 58th tune in Playford's English



Dancing Master of 1651; Mordants for violin and piano by Martijn Padding (NL), a mordant being a short, snappy Baroque ornament; and John Jenkins by Marc Sabat (CA/DE). John Jenkins, commissioned by Continuum and Evenings of New Music (Bratislava) and given its Canadian premiere at this concert, recalls in its title the 17th century English composer of dance music but is based more closely on a Bach ricercar. In one way or another, all the pieces speak of dance and make a connection between new music and the Baroque.

Over the past decade, "The Golden Age" of Ethiopian sounds of the '60s and '70s has been brought closer to the mainstream by high-profile fans as diverse as Jim Jarmusch, Budos Band and Kanye West, all enchanted by its exotic combination of funky rhythms and eerie pentatonic modes. Artists of that era, most notably Mulatu Astatke, have benefitted from this international attention.

Toronto contains the second largest Ethiopian population in North America, and the sounds of Ethiopia and Eritrea hold

a special place in the city's musical landscape. Moreover, the community has a very visible downtown presence in Bloorcourt Village. This is likely a contributing factor in its rich musical traditions resonating with the high concentration of musicians of all stripes living in the neighbourhood. If you've experienced a night out in one of Bloor and Ossington's clubs, chances are you've seen bands featuring Girma Wolde Michael.

Girma Wolde Michael's Ethio Fidel

A saxophonist who studied with Mulatu Astatke and Getachew Mekuria (who performed in Toronto with The Ex in 2009), Wolde Michael is one of many musicians from the Golden Age residing in southern Ontario. Girma is the first-call bandleader for visiting stars such as Mahmoud Ahmed, and also leads the Ethio Stars band. He will be drawing from the repertoire of the Golden Age with his Ethio Fidel band for this Music Gallery presentation.



The Images Festival and the Music Gallery are pleased to present a collaborative film projection and live music performance by Toronto composer Allison Cameron and San Francisco filmmaker Paul Clipson.

Paul Clipson's films and performances are intuitive and improvisational —marked by a distinctive use of hand-held shooting and in-camera editing. Clipson's choice of S8mm film stock affords his films a rich and saturated palette while the superimposition of images provides a unique visual rhythm, blending micro and macro views of urban and natural landscapes. Clipson says his films are personal recordings, like a diary or sketchbook: "I'm less concerned with a preconceived end result and more with being immersed in a visual exploration of the moment."

Allison Cameron composes contemporary classical music for a wide range of traditional and unconventional musical instruments. Her music is subtle and inventive, foregrounding the distinct qualities of the instruments in each composition. The abstract and structural aspects of her work are balanced with qualities of intimacy and humour.

Norma Beecroft (continued)

One of the most remarkable figures of her generation, Norma Beecroft has built a career not only based on her award-winning compositions and pioneering work in the electroacoustic community, but also as a producer, radio host and advocate. In addition, she co-founded New Music Concerts in 1971, was president of the Canadian Music Associates and Ten Centuries Concerts, won a Major Armstrong Award for excellence in broadcasting for her documentary The Computer in Music and also made documentaries about Jean Coulthard, Harry Freedman, Bruce Mather, Barbara Pentland, Harry Somers, Gilles Tremblay, John Weinzweig, Murray Adaskin and Violet Archer.

In the words of the musicologist Jennifer Bain, "to recount the musical and professional life of Norma Beecroft is to provide a fascinating perspective on new music in the latter half of the twentieth century in Canada and abroad." Beecroft studied composition with John Weinzweig in Toronto, and with Aaron Copland and Lukas Foss at Tanglewood. While at Darmstadt, she heard a live performance (possibly the premiere) of Stockhausen's Kontakte and was introduced to the ideas of John Cage when she fell upon a class being led by David Tudor.

This program features works spanning six decades, including her classic *Tre Pezzi Brevi*, published by Vienna's Universal Edition, and the more recent *Amplified String Quartet*.

Four nuns traveling by canoe toward an unknown destination, a small-town stenographer crowned beauty queen, a landlocked mermaid, and a reckless runaway with one true wish—these are some of the characters that inhabit the songs of Winnipeg singer/songwriter Christine Fellows. With a style that is at once intelligent and disarming, Fellows has emerged as one of the most original voices on the Canadian music scene. Spin Magazine's four-star review of Fellows' 2007 album, *Nevertheless*, hails her songwriting as "... slyly unpredictable, rarely self-serious, and unabashedly tuneful."

Fellows will be touring throughout 2011 in support of her fifth solo album *Femmes de chez nous*, and new performance film *Reliquary/Reliquaire*, backed by cellists Leanne Zacharias and Alex McMaster.

An avid interdisciplinary collaborator, Fellows often works with visual artists, choreographers, filmmakers and musicians from all disciplines to create performance works, scores and spectacles. She was Composer-in-Residence at Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers (2007-08), Artist-in-Residence at Le Musée de Saint-Boniface Museum in Winnipeg (2009), and most recently, Dawson City Music Festival's Songwriter-in-Residence (2011).



Hauschka (a.k.a. Volker Bertelmann) first appeared at the Music Gallery in the autumn of 2007. He entranced the audience with his prepared piano pieces: magical miniatures that showed the influence of modern electronic music in an acoustic context. That evening was a double bill with Toronto's John Kameel Farah, which culminated in an improv piano duo by the pair.

Hauschka similarly stole the show at the Music Gallery's X Avant New Music Festival in 2009 during a stunning double-bill performance with krautrock countrymen Cluster. Backed by a string quartet, they conjured surreal soundscapes punctuated by the rattling of piano hammers striking ping-pong balls, paper clips, bottle caps and a seemingly endless array of other day-to-day objects.

Foreign Landscapes sees Bertelmann making ambitious advances on his previous work, resetting his music within a rich orchestral score.

New Ancient Strings is the title of an album by kora masters Toumani Diabate and Ballake Sissoko. in which they reconsidered the range and musicality of their instruments. The Music Gallery transplants this concept eastward to Iran to journey through the past and future of Persian music.

Amir Amiri / Ziva Tabassian

The Montreal-based duo of Amir Amiri (santur) and Ziya Tabassian (percussion) are accomplished solo performers who have worked together once before at the Banff Centre. Amiri brings vast knowledge and technique to his instrument, investigating every aspect of its dulcimer-like tones. While he is classically trained, Amiri has always sought to explore the limits of his music, stretching beyond the constraints of classical thought. Tabassian demonstrates a similar fearlessness with his art. His solo album Tombak featured composition and performance for solo hand drums that is both highly rhythmic and electro-acoustic in its subtle use of timbre. Together they use Persian motifs as a starting point for intense improvisation.

Araz Salek makes a welcome return to the Music Gallery following his triumphant concert with Shiraz Ensemble in 2010. Born in Tehran, he started playing the tar (Persian lute) at the age of eight under the instruction of Tofigh Iranparvar. He further studied Iranian classical repertoire under the supervision of master tar players Hooshang Zarif, Arshad Tahmasebi and Hossein Omoumi.
